TREASURER'S REPORT

Thank you to the 763 people who have paid dues. We are trying to get 1,000 homes to pay. If you received an envelope in this newsletter, then please send it in with your \$15 dues. As of the middle of September, we have \$39,056 in checking and money market accounts. We have plenty of money for our North End Sign, which should be up soon.

BEAUTIFICATION

Hopefully by the time you read this you will have noticed that the City Landscaping crews have trimmed back and removed the "too low" and dead branches from the trees in the median. They often get snagged by school buses and delivery trucks and can become increasingly hazardous to scratching cars and to bikers. For those trees and landscaping on the east side of Atlantic and the west side of the feeder road, the City is sometimes reluctant to trim back resident's landscaping. As a rule in thumb for corner properties, a proper and legal "sightline" is the hypotenuse of a triangle with the legs each 20 feet from the paved corner of the intersection. The "algebra-challenged" can give me a call. All other property owners should trim their landscaping to allow parallel parking or conform with any posted restrictions. Tree branches should probably allow for an 8-foot clearance. Any cuttings will be picked up automatically on Tuesdays if they are in 4' by 4' roadside piles.

STREETS, PARKING & UTILITIES

Over the past several months, we only had one serious rain that put our new pumps to use...and they worked. Atlantic did not flood. Every street has a few drains and too often trash and/or mulch is washed into them. While some material will enter, invariably some just sits on the grate waiting to hold back the water to flood the street. I take a shovel out from time to time and clear the three on 66th and suggest you look into doing it as well. If you have a blocked drain, call 385 1470 and the City will send a crew.

For the most part the owners have taken care of our visibility problem at street corners since being advised. Sometimes the City does the job. If there is a hazard caused by bushes or trees that should be trimmed, please email me or call and I will contact the proper people at the City.

If street lights are out, call 385-4131. As simple as it might sound, they will want the location as well as the Pole number which you'll find somewhere on the pole itself.

We don't have as much trouble with garbage cans left on the streets after tourist season, however sometimes material is put out that is not picked up. If you have a special pickup, you need to call Waste Management at 385-4650 to ensure it gets done.

CURRENT RESORT NEWS

Laskin Gateway continues to move towards completion by Fall 2013. The round-s-bout is current closed until October 11th for the construction of the sculpture and associated foundation. The NVBCL continues to monitor the traffic alerts on the Laskin Road Gateway. All traffic updates are found on the city's web site <u>www.vbgov.com</u>

The next resort streetscape projects in the resort to be addressed are 29th street from Pacific Avenue to Aortic Avenue, Winston Salem from Pacific Avenue to Mediterranean Avenue, and 19th street from the Convention Center east to the Dome site. Pacific Avenue improvements are planned in association with the Dome site project from 16th street north to 22nd street.

BEACHES & RECREATION

The board recently received a briefing from the Beaches & Waterways Commission. They were tasked by City Council to identify how future sand replenishments can be funded. They are in the early stages of getting input from the community. Our take was that, rather than raise the city real estate tax to pay for future sand replenishments, they were leaning towards developing a Special Service District (SSD) to raise real estate taxes on the community immediately adjacent to the beach. Before you jump out of your chair, SSD's cannot be created without a majority vote of the affected neighborhood.

The board drafted talking points for the commission that included:

- The NVBCL beach area was originally added to the "Big Beach project" in 2001 over our objections so that the cost/benefit ratios would meet federal guidelines for funding of the project. Additionally, we were told that future FEMA flood insurance support for our area depended upon having a bigger beach. At the time we were told there was a commitment to replenish sand for the next 50 years.

The NVBCL beach is the only beach contiguous with the resort beach. Consequently, our beach serves as an overflow for the resort beach for tourists (local and non local) who want less congestion and free parking.
NVBCL property owners already pay much higher taxes as a result of proximity to the beach.

- The beach in the 40's, 50's and 60's needs sand periodically while the beach in the 70's and 80's does not. Getting home owners in about 40% of the neighborhood to vote for higher taxes, when they don't need the sand, would be problematic.

- In the past dune grasses have naturally started spreading in the 40's and 50's; yet the city has plowed them away. Changing this policy and letting grasses and sand cover to expand in the 40's and 50's could improve sand retention and possibly allow dunes to grow.

- The NVBCL believes that sand replenishment should be a city-wide responsibility; a 1 or 2 cent increase in property taxes should suffice to fund a restricted sand replenishment fund (fenced for sand replenishment only). Putting such a burden on just a few property owners would require a far higher increase in property taxes should the city choose to go a Special Service District route.
