Cavalier update

On May 6th, several people were invited to a preview tour of the Old Cavalier Hotel sponsored by Bruce Thompson and some of his development team. We also got a preview and some conceptual ideas for the new Oceanfront hotel across the street. The tour comprised residents who live nearby, North End civic league officers, residents of Ocean Hills and select members of the Virginia Historical Society. So here is some information from a few of my tour notes:

- The Hunt Room stays, as does the fireplace. It will be enhanced to allow for dining, entertainment, etc.
- The bourbon distillery will be directly behind the Hunt Room and will be open for tours and tastings. If you read the Beacon recently, you saw this was approved and moving forward.
- The project is expensive, more than estimated. Higher costs due to the shape of the Old Cavalier at the time of purchase and working with the Historical Society to preserve the building according to plans and procedures.
- The ballroom and main floors have outstanding features, and off the back an outdoor, terrace style restaurant is planned.
- The pool, spa and exercise rooms will be on the bottom floor. Thompson envisions the Old Cavalier to

be the premier wedding locale in Virginia.

- In total, there will be 60 rooms or so and about 32 suites. A lot of research has gone into making this a mix of history, elegance and style without being stodgy. As Thompson put it, "The hotel should have a little edge to it, and energy."
- Plans are to open late spring or early next summer.

Likewise, a few more notes on the new property on the Atlantic side of the street:

- Will be a Marriott property; we got a sneak preview, and I definitely approved of the look it will be a showcase hotel.
- Much thought is going into how to pull the two properties together. Some ideas were offered up for opinions, and it was my estimation that they will be excellent ideas some on the way, some still being considered, and the team was really seeking input from the neighbors before advancing some of their plans.
- The Beach Club area will be totally redone, and some oceanside condos are planned all well-done, all well-placed within the boundaries of the property.

Once more information becomes reality, Thompson has offered to come back to the civic league to make an updated presentation.

BEAUTIFICATION: SO LONG, OLEANDERS?

At the NVBCL board meeting June 9, a presentation and update was made regarding the dead oleanders in the bedding up and down the North End's median along Atlantic Avenue.

The city began June 10 to remove all the dead plants, starting in the lower 40s and moving up Atlantic. A lively discussion was held as to what to replace the oleanders with, mainly seeking native plants that should survive the winters, high heat and salt burn. There were not a lot of really good choices, but that did lead us to a re-examination of the entire feeder road, which is truly a gateway to our neighborhood streets and the resort area.

With that in mind, we have formed a committee to review

possibly making the entire feeder road median area a virtual linear park, filled with more live oaks and other, low plantings. We feel it might be a great opportunity to work with the city to vastly improve our North End and to end the beds that continue to not support hearty and pretty plants and get heavily weeded.

We will have more news at the regular civic league meeting, and our proposed deadline for a plan to the city is Oct. 1.

The committee members are directors Billy Almond, Dave Jester, Jack Dresher and Jim Spruance. We encourage North End residents to submit ideas and comments to any of us.
