existing and recently planted live oaks in the median from 42nd to 89th streets. *(Story, Page 3)* Jim Spruance, Billy Almond, Dave Jester and I have continued to work with the city to see this effort through. On March 10 Dave and I met with Frank Fentress, director of the city's Landscape Management Division, and toured each block to finalize the undertaking, which includes replacement of dying and stressed trees. Mr. Fentress could not have been more helpful and has assured us that the remaining tasks will be completed in the fall at the latest.

At last, the North End neighborhood signs have been erected. Your board, primarily through the exemplary efforts of Billy Almond, Dave Jester and Kimberly Goold, started the design and city approval process over five years ago - yes, you read that correctly. The obstacles to what one would believe to be a fairly simple task proved daunting. Extended negotiations, memorandum of understanding revisions and repeated changes to the city's seemingly never-ending requirements - coupled with liability insurance issues, design, construction, maintenance and installment restrictions and responsibilities – left any number of us wondering whether we would be around long enough to see the signs in place.

We made it and are quite pleased with the end result. We hope you are.

### Dog etiquette on the beaches

Editor's note A pet dog was killed on the beach at 47th Street on Christmas, and subsequently a committee of concerned neighbors started meeting to discuss what could be done to prevent such incidents. The primary finding was better education of the public of expectations for dog etiquette. This information has been shared with the city's animal control staff, and the city's tourist information folks say they will include it in their visitors materials and on their website. The following was written by committee head Gayle Johnson; I was an observer member since it affected our beach. – **Ron Pearson** 

Virginia Beach is an unusually dog-friendly town. The law allows dogs to be off-leash on the beach, but they are not allowed on the beach at all between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day. This applies to residential beaches only: No dogs are allowed on

the beach between Rudee Inlet and 42nd Street during the summer.

However, if dogs are offleash, they must be under direct, positive voice control at all times. The tragic death of the toy poodle Petey on Christmas Day has sparked us to remind everyone to observe common sense dog etiquette in order to make the beach safe and enjoyable for all:

■ Keep your dog on a leash unless it can be recalled reliably and quickly even with distractions.

■ Handler must not get distracted but must keep a watchful eye on an off-leash dog at all times.

■ Keep Fido from running up uninvited to all unknown people, such as small children, joggers, the elderly, photographers on a photo shoot.

■ Keep Fido from running up to leashed dogs and unfamiliar dogs that might be anxious or fearful. Normally well-behaved dogs can become more aggressive around unfamiliar dogs. Dogs that are leashed might feel threatened by offleash dogs charging at them.

■ Retain a leash at all times so you can quickly leash and remove your dog in the event of a problem.

■ Leash and remove your dog immediately at the first sign of fearful, anxious or aggressive behavior.

Dogs off-leash might go

after balls that do not belong to them, which can lead to aggressive behavior. Do not allow your dog to play ball with an unfamiliar dog.

■ If a fight breaks out, pull the dogs apart from the back. Exchange contact info, and call Animal Control immediately: (757) 385-5000, ext. 2.

■ Fill in any holes dug in the sand so other people and dogs won't fall in.

■ Always scoop the poop, year 'round.

Advanced recall training is highly recommended so owners can reliably control an off-leash dog in the face of a dangerous situation and in spite of distractions. Your dog will thank you for the additional training, and you can rest assured that you have more control if a dangerous situation arises. This spring we are organizing small classes on the beach with neighbors to provide this training conveniently and enjoyably.

It is important for dog owners to remember that not everyone is a dog person and not every dog is dog-friendly! The future of the privilege to let dogs be off-leash on the beach depends on the ability of dog owners to self-monitor. Many beaches have banned dogs because of incidents or because too many owners did not clean up after their animals. In a world where one bad experience can ruin it for everyone else, all dog owners need to help maintain common sense dog etiquette - For Petey's Sake!



#### **BUDGET/ASSESSMENTS/TAXES**

#### GOOD NEWS, BAD IN CITY'S 2016-17 BUDGET PLAN

The city manager's proposed 2016-17 fiscal-year budget contains no increase in any tax rate or in water, sanitary sewer and storm water fees. The manager's budget does propose to increase the solid-waste fee by \$1.64 per month, from \$21.36 to \$23. Public hearings on the budget are scheduled for 6 p.m. Thursday, April 21, at Cox High School and Tuesday, April 26, in City Council Chambers.

While Virginia Beach continues to have the lowest real estate tax rate (99 cents per \$100 of assessed value) in the region, real estate assessments in Virginia Beach are rising again – for the third year in a row after five consecutive years of decreases. Citywide, average residential property assessment increases for FY 2017 were 2.79%. According to the Real Estate Assessor's

annual report, increases for the 2,258 parcels in the North Virginia Beach neighborhood averaged 10.41%. The neighborhood's mean value is \$853,352; the median is \$692,000.

# SO, WHAT'S NEW IN THE MEDIAN?





SWEETBAY MAGNOLIA

THE ATLANTIC MEDIAN tree-planting contract has been completed, and the Beautification Committee has offered a few suggestions that have been approved by the city's Parks and Recreation Landscape Division, including:

■ Install three to four new trees in the 6100 block (apparently missed).

■ Install five to six trees (total) on five blocks with obvious gaps.

■ Remove vines and clean up 47th Street's northwest corner.

■ Remove the final yucca bed at 54th.

■ And continue to monitor the survival of live oaks planted





last year (by a now-defunct contractor).

In addition, we will contact the pertinent utility companies to encourage them to landscape/screen their respective connection boxes.

Any further median landscape enhancements (i.e., bedding and shrubs) will probably



be held in abeyance until after we can analyze the overall look of a full growing season.

All residents are encouraged to help maintain our improved median and public rights-ofway by helping to keep them clear of trash AND SIGNAGE. With a potentially raucous political campaign season looming, it is important for all of us to remove or report signs immediately before they encourage others to post still more signs. (If you have any doubts about proliferation, just check the corners near shopping malls and expressway exits.) Report illegally placed signs to the city's code enforcement office: 385-8074.

#### **DEVELOPMENT CONTROL**

#### Update: Resort Area Master Plan and Form Based Codes

A committee was formed in late 2015 to study the effects of the Oceanfront Resort District (ORD) Form Based Code (FBC) on hospitality development in the resort area. This group consists of representatives of the Virginia Beach Hotel Association, the Resort Advisory Commission, Resort Beach Civic League, resort architects and land-use attorneys as well as Strategic Growth Area and planning staff.

The committee was formed by councilman John Uhrin to study the issues that have arisen during the first few ORD FBC projects. The 27th Street Hyatt complex is under construction, and several hotels have been designed under the FBC, which has resulted in issues regarding hotel access, parking, density and setback issues.

Several revisions to the FBC are in the works for 2016 that will involve public hearings, the Planning Commission and City Council actions.

**Light rail** The City Council voted, 9-2, April 5 to continue pursuing extending The Tide into the city. The first agreement approved would keep the project on track without delays. The second would start the process of buying three rail cars for just under \$20 million.

**Zoning review North End Overlay** This initiative, which initially allows for two detached cottages on one lot by-right, passed City Council Nov. 17. Several residential developers have embraced this concept, and we look forward to seeing this alternative constructed at the North End in lieu of the larger duplexes.
