A LETTER FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

COUNCIL VOTE DELAYS ACTION ON STR RULES

Short-term rental rules continue to be an important issue for all North End residents. At press time, City Council had not yet made a decision on the issue.

AM HAPPY to be writing a President's letter that finally precedes a General Membership meeting. I have missed seeing everyone at the meetings and thank you for your support of the Civic League while we have been on a meeting hiatus.

We are considering changing our meeting day to another day of the week so as not to conflict with City Council meetings. This makes sense so that we can invite our Councilman or the Mayor to address us.

The NVBCL has been busy with the

Short Term Rental (STR) issue. At press time, Council had not yet made a decision, but has likely done so by the time you read this newsletter, I can only hope their decision benefitted our neighborhood and not outside investors.

If you have a problem with a

STR, please call 311 and report

it. Many of us, myself included, did not know that this reporting mechanism existed until recently. Reporting an STR to the city is the only way to build a quantifiable database of complaints. The lack of complaints on 311 is frequently cited by STR proponents.

In the past I have advocated the use of See Click Fix to resolve issues in our neighborhood. The City has transitioned away from See Click Fix to the VB Works widget. You can find the widget at: https://www.vbgov.com/services/Pages/report-problems.aspx. There are also links to Android and iOS VB Works apps on that page.

Using either method, you can make a request for service or report an issue as an anonymous guest or as a registered user. Please use VB Works whenever you find an issue in the North End as it builds a quantifiable and traceable database of requests.

Canceled Why did the North End Market not get off the ground?

An outdoor market was supposed to open May 30 at the A.R.E. Center, but it looks like it won't happen any time soon.

The market was to be hosted by the GRAZE Kitchen cafe in the A.R.E. parking lot, and the Association for Research and Enlightenment was to have its own market at the same time on the nearby lawn, according to cafe owner Shelley Kilby.

"We buy so many local products, and some asked if we ever thought of a market," she told the NVBCL News in April, when she told us about the market plans. "I think it'll be a lot of fun."

It might have been a fun addition to the North End scene, but what appears to have been a misunderstanding between the organizers and the city's Special Events Office

Plantings & more Trees, shrubs, signs all get some landscaping attention

The city's Landscape Division has been on track following up with normal spring maintenance: annual plantings at our two North End welcome signs, biweekly Atlantic Avenue median cuttings and replacing trees and shrubs (6200 and 7100 blocks of the median).

Public Works has resurrected a "lost" portion of 78th Street's landside sidewalk at the request of a couple of neighbors. After years of new construction, only a few of our North End streets still have portions of these original sidewalks, usually found in front of the original houses!

78th isn't the only one,

however. As possibly the only block with a continuous sidewalk, maybe we should designate landside 64th Street as "The North End Promenade."

Our own Billy Almond has been working with the Wyndham hotel concerning barrier landscaping along oceanside 57th Street. We have seen the plans, and despite the area's constraints, we expect some beautiful improvement in the fall/ winter planting season. Think a solid phalanx of Sky Pencil Japanese Hol-

CITY GOVERNMENT

Council OKs \$2.3 billion budget, cuts tax rate

The City Council unanimously approved a \$2.3 billion budget May 11 for the city's 2021-22 fiscal year.

The real estate tax rate was lowered to 99 cents for each \$100 of assessed valuation – the lowest among Hampton Roads' cities. The current rate is

set at \$1.0175.

The council voted to cut the real estate tax rate further than the reduction to \$1.0075 the city manager had recommended. Otherwise, the approved budget adopted recommendations proposed by the city manager.

City law enforcement and emergency workers are set to receive an 8.5

percent raise, and teachers will get a 5 percent raise. All other Virginia Beach employees will earn 4.5 percent more than they do

To address short-term rental regulation, operators will now pay a \$200 yearly fee that will fund hiring two new city employees to enforce compliance with short-term rental rules.

RESORT AREA UPDATE

Businesses make a comeback; several projects move ahead

The Resort continues to rebound from the COVID-19 pandemic. Visitation is up, and bookings are coming in fast. We are grateful to see the North American Sand Soccer Tournament, live music and weekly gatherings return. We are well on our way to a successful tourism season.

As you may be aware, our Resort Management Office has now opened at 401 17th St., and new Resort Manager Lisa Bleakley will start soon.

The Resort Area Mobility Plan (RAMP) study is in full swing and is expected to be completed in the fall. You will notice that the Wave trolley has been returned to Atlantic Avenue northbound, from 25th to 40th, due to low ridership on the Pacific Avenue alignment.

Second Precinct police are setting up a new storefront in the former location of The Boxx, between 21st and 22nd on Atlantic. This will provide a presence for police, EMS, ABC and other city staff directly on Atlantic. Our new chief of police, Paul Neudigate, has been very clear that the needs of the 2nd Precinct are one

of his top priorities.

He comes to us from Cincinnati, where he has extensive experience in dealing with large festive crowds with the football Bengals and baseball Reds. The 2nd Precinct's new captain is Harry McBrien, who has a long history with our resort.

Several transportation projects are in the works, including the planning for the Laskin Road improvements from the round-about to Birdneck Road, Pacific Avenue safety improvements and streetscape improvements along 17th Street from Pacific to Cypress Avenue.

BEWARE 68th ST. HANDRAILS, **ROUGH SURF** AND LOOSE CATS

There are still two dangerous, sharp edges on the handrail at the 68th Street beach (photo below) The city was notified a year ago but has not yet fixed it. We are following up. Please keep an eye on the little ones on that crosswalk so they do not injure themselves.

The missing handrail at 58th has been ordered, and we are following up to see that it is installed. In addition, the city plans to remove some of the excess sand behind the bench at 58th as well as north of the sidewalk.

After Memorial Day, dogs are not allowed on the beach between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Please take your fur friend in the morning or after dinner. Their paws (from the hot sand) will thank you!

Red flags warning of dangerous surf should be posted (when warranted) every other block. Occasionally, the Lifeguard Service forgets. Please notify me should this situation arise.

Surfing is restricted between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. Friday through Sunday unless those red flags are flying. Leashes are required, and no surfing of the shore break.

Hobie Cats must be parked at the base of the dune - not midbeach and not in the dune. FYI. the city is proposing a requirement for these catamarans to be tied to sand anchors so they don't become flying objects during hurricanes and nor'easters. This is a good practice - you should do it now.

A special thank-you to the woman (and those like her) doing her morning walk on the beach in the 60s and carrying a trash bag and cleaning our beach. Also, to those who help keep the sand off our crosswalks!

stopped it before it could get going.

Kilby said she was told "someone" complained that the market would create too much traffic around the A.R.E. Center, even though she said they already had received city permission to hold it.

"I had to get a completely different business license for the North End Market and applied and was approved," Kilby said. "I asked if there was anything else I needed to do, and they told me no because it was all set up as a community market. I had that license before I even started planning the times, vendors, etc. to insure we could actually do it.

"Then weeks after on a Friday at 4 p.m. (of course so I couldn't get any clarification until Monday), I received the call about the complaint."

That account doesn't square with the city's explanation.

"It does not appear that the City withdrew its approval for this event but

rather, the event organizers did not file the appropriate paperwork for either a special event permit or a Conditional

Use Permit," Nancy Bloom, community affairs liaison in the City Manager's Office, emailed the NVBCL News on June 9.

We were unable to reconcile those positions by press time.

Would Kilby pursue trying to get the market off the ground?

"I'm not sure if I will or not. I think with catering picking up so much, it might just be more than I can handle."

ZONING REVIEW

'50% RULE' EXPLAINED

The Zoning Review Committee has had several requests recently about what is required to have a house remain in place and be vested.

For years, the city used the "50% rule" in terms of the amount of house that had to remain to expand in the location on a property if the house was nonconforming.
