A LETTER FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

2nd PRECINCT CO'S FOCUS INCLUDES NE

Commander's recent talk to civic league members went beyond crime stats for Virginia Beach and shed some light on issues specific to the North End, such as vehicle larcenies, surge beach parties and added police officers for summer.

POLICE CAPTAIN Bradley Wessler, commander of the Second Precinct, which provides police protection to North End residents, was our most recent guest speaker and provided one of the most informative discussions of ongoing actions to make our community safer.

Crime of all types continues to decline throughout the city. He reported that last calendar year, for example:

- Property crime was down 4.3 percent from 2023.
- Motor vehicle larcenies were down 17 percent, and motor vehicle thefts dropped 23 percent.
- Shooting incidents decreased by 49 percent, and the Police Department reported it seized or came into possession of 1,221 illegally possessed firearms in 2024.
- The homicide rate fell by 46 percent.
- Citywide vehicle crashes decreased 4 percent since 2023 and 7 percent since 2022. Fatal accidents were down 31 percent since 2023.

In my opinion, crime reduction begins with individual police officers, their professionalism and their determination to be the best possible police force. Combine

this with expanding use of technology, the department's Real Time Crime Center, ongoing regional teamwork and collaboration, and the results naturally come. We have such a police department in Virginia Beach.

Capt. Wessler also addressed a number of issues specific to the North End, including:

■ The No. 1 crime continues to be vehicle larcenies, principally in the hotel areas. The best way to protect your vehicle is to lock its doors and windows and do not have any valuables visible.

■ An unofficial flash/surge party has been occurring between 64th and 66th streets the past several years. Last year,

a crowd estimated at between 500 and 1,000 people from about 18 to 25 years old quickly surged onto the beach. Cars were dropping people off and then parking throughout the North End, creating parking and traffic problems.

While the beach is a public resource and open to everyone, the police responded with about 10 officers to serve as crowd control. The VBPD will proactively monitor social network sites in an attempt to get ahead of this event this year.

Beach Ops has a lot to deal with, and we can lend a hand

Summer in Virginia Beach is in full swing, and the beaches are busy!

That means more maintenance for the city's Beach Operations team with all the events every week at the south end, and July 4th celebrations on every beach.

Every year Beach Operations has to distinguish and dispose of many burned or burning trash cans from fireworks the night before. So be careful, and as residents, remember to be good stewards of our beaches and try to pick up trash and debris when possible.

The city has completed installing the three service-access gates on 57th, 68th and 79th streets. Beach Operations also plans to remove and replace some of the old

wooden fencing bordering these access walkways. They would replace them with white PVC fencing. This likely will not happen until the fall.

The blue recycling cans on the beach have been delayed due to service issues with the lone vehicle used to collect them.

As of this writing in mid-June, I did not have an estimate for when it would be back in service, but once it's repaired, the cans will go back out on the beach.

The sand replenishment project at the south end of the beach has been postponed until a new plan is approved. When the dredging began the sand was found to be unacceptable – it was like clay. The operation has moved south of Rudee Inlet for Croatan's residents to enjoy for the summer.

Goldfinches' veggie diet means a late-start lifestyle

A bright-yellow goldfinch at the feeder lit up a recent dismal rainy day as if the sun were shining brightly.

Male goldfinches are in their best yellow finery this time of year. Golden yellow with black heads and wings, the males also are foot loose and fancy free, out to impress the ladies.

Most other bird species these days are toiling away at feeding and caring for young in the nest or keeping up with toddler babies hopping around and getting into trouble.

But there's no June bride tradition or mating finery to worry about among the drab females. They remain pale yellowish green with black

wings year around. Goldfinches wait to mate in late June or July when some flowers have begun to go to seed.

They nest late in the year because they are about the only vegetarians in the bird world. Seeds supplemented by berries is the goldfinch diet. Were they to have a nest full of babies in spring, there would not be enough seeds to feed those hungry mouths. Other baby birds thrive on insects, but goldfinch babies don't eat insects at all.

In May or June you might see goldfinches, male and female alike, still out partying, check-

ing out the neighborhood feeder bars.

I wish I had a better photo than this one, which is years old, but if nothing else it's good for pointing out the difference between showy males and drab females. Just to confuse matters a little, first-year males – bright yellow without a black head – are also among the flocks this time of year.

Later in summer, when the babies are out of the nest, you again will see the goldfinches grouped up to feed, this time more on the ground under the flowers where seeds have fallen.

You may not even know they are there until you get close. Suddenly goldfinches, young and old, burst from under the plants and fly off twittering!

Often goldfinches stay around all year to decorate your feeders, but the males are never prettier than they are in mating season.

ZONING ISSUES

ZRC CAN HELP WITH OPTIONS WHEN SELLING PROPERTIES

The NVBCL Zoning Review Committee continues to review applicants' requests for variances on the second Thursday of the month at 6 p.m. Recently the meetings have been held virtually via Zoom. If you wish to meet with the ZRC, please let us know – see contact info below.

Construction at the North End continues to be very active. Property owners are selling to developers who are tearing down older cottages and building duplexes or the detached-cottage schemes. We ask that before you sell your property to a developer, talk with the ZRC regarding your options for redevelopment.

We remind our neighbors that developers have three "by right" options for North End properties: a single-family house, duplex or two detached cottages on one parcel. ("By right development" refers to the approval of proposed projects as a matter of right if they comply with land-use regulations, without the need for discretionary review or approval.)

The two detached-cottage options are an incentive-based design guideline, and a developer must comply with the design criteria in the overlay ordinance.

We remind our neighbors that any opportunity to determine what type of redevelopment happens on your street starts with the "Seller of the Parcel"; once the parcel has been sold, it is in the hands of the buyer, who has the three "by right" options listed above.

We are seeing an increase in illegal, nonpermitted construction including driveway expansions, shed construction, decks, terraces, fences and house additions. If you see construction on your street and do not see a visible city permit displayed on the property, please contact any member of the Zoning Review Committee or call the city's Permits and Inspections office at (757) 385-8060.

Don't be a victim of financial crime

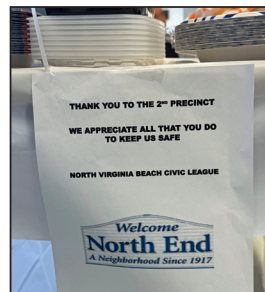
Police Detective Caleb Davey of VBPD's Economic Crimes Unit shared key advice at the 2nd Precinct's Citizens Advisory Committee meeting May 14 to prevent financial victimization:

- Never let others use your cellphone: Scammers can access bank accounts in moments.
- Freeze your credit score with ratings firms Experian, TransUnion and Equifax. You can easily unfreeze it when needed.
- Check for skimmers when using a credit card; thieves attach these devices to card readers to access a card's data. Use "Tap to Pay" if possible instead of swiping a card.
- Avoid debit cards for purchases; it's harder to recover funds than with credit cards.

If you become a victim, report it to Det. Davey at (757) 385-4101.

Precinct Commander
Capt. Bradley Wesseler provided an update on the April 24-27 College Beach Weekend, stating that police had not anticipated the sheer volume of attendees or the number of weapons present at the Oceanfront.
